One of the most requested opportunities from them is to assist with is the Public Order Department with their Level 2 Refresher training.

They get to ask questions of the trainers about what is being taught, see how effective and swift, tactics of all different kinds can bring about a safe resolution and get an idea of what it means to be on the front-line of modern policing.



PC 27242 Jenni Lawrence, who runs the Public Order sessions for her team, has this to say about her experience working with the Cadets:

"We have run a couple of sessions of our public order refresher courses, and both times we have managed to arrange for a number of the cadets to come and help us out as crowd. The impact of having a crowd at the training is invaluable, it adds to the reality of the situation, without which the training would have a much lesser impact.

The Cadets have attended with great energy and enthusiasm bringing a dose of realism to the training. I have noted however, that whilst energy is high, the cadets do everything they are asked to do, they follow the rules and boundaries and don't cause any issues at all. I have no doubt this is also in no small part due to the leadership of the cadet Leaders! We have lots of further refresher dates coming up, and we are looking forward to working with the cadets for as many of these as you can manage!

Gwent Cadets visit Hope Rescue





In October, Cadets from the Torfaen and Newport VPC units in Gwent, took a trip down the M4 to visit @HopeRescueWales at their Kennels in Pontyclun.

Back in September the Cadets had offered their time to help at the Bi-Annual #DuckRace held in Swan Meadow, Abergavenny to help raise vital funds for the work that Hope Rescue do to look after and rehabilitate lost, stray, seized and unwanted dogs across the South Wales and Gwent force areas.


He immediately returned and set up the units in Brussels.

One cadet helped at an old peoples home, and another cadet climbed Snowden!


They also had to raise £35 each for the charity and the group managed to raise £560 pounds in total.

The Kent Volunteer Police Cadet programme celebrated its second annual leaders' conference, bringing together 53 leaders from across the county for a day of recognition, collaboration, and forward planning.



The highlight of the day was the Chief Constable personally presenting the Kings Award for Voluntary Service (KAVS) certificates to leaders. Whilst all leaders had previously received their KAVS pin badges and attended the parade in April, this was the first opportunity for the Chief to see them all together and acknowledge their outstanding contribution.

Leaders also enjoyed the first viewing of the latest cadet video, showcasing the incredible work they do to support young people and their communities.

The conference featured two guest speakers:

PS Glen Rickersey from Operation Makesafe, who shared vital safeguarding insights and Adam Westgarth from Corporate Communications, who offered practical guidance on engaging with the media.

The forces' central VPC team reviewed the programme's achievements over the past year and shared exciting plans for 2026, including a new cadet programme designed to provide leaders with 100+ session plans focused on scenario-based and game-led learning.

Leaders were also updated on the "You Said, We Did" actions following last year's conference and the recent leader survey, ensuring their voices continue to shape the programme.

Since the programme began, leaders and cadets have contributed an incredible 113,072 volunteering hours - This milestone reflects the dedication and passion of every volunteer involved.

A Blue Sky Thinking lunch encouraged leaders to share fresh ideas, many of which will be taken forward. The day concluded with an open Q&A session with the central team, followed by an evening social with pizza and conversation, reinforcing the sense of community among leaders.

This event not only celebrated the achievements of the past year but also sets the stage for continued growth and innovation in the Kent VPC programme.
