Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II

1926 - 2022

We start this newsletter acknowledging the passing of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II.

We in the VPC, as all within the policing family, were saddened to hear the news back in September of the death of Her Majesty.

Many VPC units participated at services of commemoration and thanksgiving for Her Majesty together with ceremonies to proclaim King Charles' III as the new King.

Police Officers are servants of the Crown and swear allegiance to the reigning Monarch when taking up the office of Constable.

Winner of the Team Cadet Award 2022

Lara, aged 14, was presented with the Volunteer Police Cadet Individual Award for helping to create a trauma-informed custody suite for young people in Northamptonshire. The suite has appropriate reading material and videos to guide young people through the custody process, recognising many have had adverse childhood experiences that have affected their behaviour and choices. The force credited Lara with changing the mindset of officers, highlighting how custody presents a chance to put young people back on the right track.

VPC Leader making a big impact



Cadet Leader Samuel Wright received the award for Young Person Making the Most Impact at the Thames Valley Criminal Justice Charity Awards Evening hosted by CEO Nikki Ross.

He won the award as he is an outstanding young man who joined as a cadet aged 13 in 2016.

He has worked his way up to being Mayor's cadet and the High Sherriff cadet during his time and been an exemplary role mode to his peers.

Since turning 18 he has become a cadet leader where he has continued to help and support others.

The event was attended by The Countess Howe, HM Lord-Lieutenant of Buckinghamshire and the Thames Valley High Sheriffs 2022/2023 who also took part in the judging of the entries. Awards for police cadets after caring for injured person

Two young Hertfordshire police cadets have earned an award after they stopped to care for an injured member of the public in Welwyn Garden City.

Cadet's Leah Brackley, 14, and Stephanie Parkinson, 15, were close to the Howard Centre when they came across a member of the public who had fallen over and sustained a head injury.

The pair, who are part of the Welwyn Hatfield cadet unit, immediately stopped to help, providing first aid and reassurance until police and paramedics arrived on the scene.



Following their actions, they were presented with Certificates of Good Work by PC Brad Glover and local Safer Neighbourhood Team Sergeant Emma Francis who said -

"The Welwyn Hatfield police cadet leaders and I are immensely proud of Leah and Steph for getting stuck in and showing good citizenship, as well as displaying the courage and tenacity to get involved and help," said PC Glover.

"As we all know, it's very easy to walk on by and ignore what's going on, as many people do.

"The skills learnt during their training as police cadets were put into practice and they were able to quickly spring into action to provide assistance."

In their groups with their adult leaders, cadets then explored both main events, meeting specialist teams, corporate and military/policing professionals, innovators, CEOs and many more.







Local young people out making a difference

Cheshire Cadets outside their comfort zone

A small team from Cheshire Police Cadets attended an activity weekend in North Wales in mid-October that was funded by **CVQO**, an education charity that supports vocational qualifications. The purpose of the weekend was to encourage the cadets to work outside their comfort zone and to complete credits towards the BTEC level 2 in Teamwork and Personal Development.





The weekend was attended by several different cadet groups including St John's Ambulance, Sea Cadets and Air Cadets who all enjoyed getting an understanding of other uniformed groups.



The cadets were challenged with making a rocket with a plastic bottle, water and a bike pump and each team was awarded points for the distance flown. Cadets were then able to buy additional items to improve the rocket's performance. Cheshire cadets really enjoyed working on this task with other cadet groups over the weekend and it helped to develop positive relationships between them.

The weekend's activities focussed on leadership, communication and team working skills that were designed to complete some of the BTEC level 2 qualification.

They completed caving, which was more exciting due to the thunder roaring outside, a woodland walk whilst blindfolded, zip line and archery. Many of these activities were completed in heavy rain but the police cadets did not let the Welsh weather dampen their enjoyment. Cheshire cadets were proud to break the record for the crate stack challenge achieving a stack of 20. The police cadets and leaders were exhausted by the Sunday afternoon, but all agreed they had a really fun weekend.
