This is **Megan**, she is a Volunteer Police Cadet with Lancashire. She is due to leave the VPC in June to start an Apprenticeship.

Megan's journey has not been an easy one but recently she has, as her Force VPC coordinator describes it, as having 'turned a corner' after being diagnosed with ADHD and Autism.

Megans' Mum recently emailed her VPC coordinator, and we felt it was important that it be shared more widely.

We often get asked 'What's the benefit of Cadets?'

It is hard to quantify what the VPC can do for the young people who take part in the programme – apart from giving Policing a tool to engage with young people, it is all about developing young people over the time they are with us into being their best selves.

Megan is one example of the impact the VPC can have, there are many more – if you have an example please let us know.

Megans Mum said -

'I Just thought I would let you know Megan has received her diagnosis of autism yesterday they said they are going to send us out her report. She also has her ADHD outcome appointment.

I want to say the biggest thankyou to yourself for all the support and effort you put into Megan. Without your help and understanding there is no doubt that Megan wouldn't be the success story she is today. The progress she has made since everyone got Involved has been tremendous. Jason, Police Safer Neighbourhoods Team, worked so hard with her and started to highlight that other issues that required looking at, thanks to Ashleigh, Children & Family Wellbeing, and to the Cadet Leaders who gave her the chance she needed to battle through her teenage years.

Since we have all started understanding her she has gone from strength to strength and even though every day can sometimes be a challenge for Megan and her family, she is advancing by the day.

I am sure she told you last week that she applied for an apprenticeship in a very good financial company in the Liver Buildings in Liverpool. Megan went from 100 interviewed to getting one of two jobs with this company. They are going to support her through all her qualifications and I think a working environment will suit her well. Unfortunately this job is 9 till 17.15 Monday to Friday and she said the only thing she is sad about is leaving Cadets but she hopes in the future she can do some work with the Police when she is settled there. Megan's brother Daniel can't wait to join Police Cadets because he has seen how much Megan has enjoyed it, so we hope that when he is 13 he could apply too.

If you could please thank absolutely everyone involved with helping Megan get all the help she needed up to this point we would be so grateful. Words are not enough to show our gratitude to you all.'

Well done to all in Lancashire VPC and to all our VPC schemes supporting and making a difference to Cadets like Megan, and good luck to Megan as she moves on from the VPC.

West Mercia Cadets receive awards.

At the recent West Mercia Police Quality Policing Awards, North Worcestershire Cadet Kayleigh Morse won the award for Volunteer of the Year.

Shortlisted alongside other exceptional volunteers from around the force, Kayleigh was presented with her award by Temporary Chief Constable Alex Murray having impressed the judges with her commitment despite several issues in her personal life.



At 17 years old and with only four years under her belt, Kayleigh has become one of the most experienced and capable cadets. She has come such a long way since she began her cadet journey as a shy 13-year-old. Kayleigh is credit to those who have the pleasure of working with her as well as herself. Despite battling her own personal difficulties outside of volunteering, she remains a confident, caring and highly committed cadet.

She has led by example with the highest number of community hours in the cohort, representing both West Mercia Police and the Volunteer Police Cadets to the highest possible standard. Kayleigh has supported local carnivals, charity fun runs, police open days and attended the annual remembrance parade.



On the 6th March Shropshire Police Cadet Alfie Wigley was awarded with the High Sheriff of Shropshire's Outstanding young citizens award 2024.

Alfie has worked in the community, supporting and assisting Safer Neighbourhood Officers, visiting vulnerable people, assisting with local policing operations, carrying out test purchasing operations designed to protect young people. He has been a visible presence in the community, providing reassurance.

He gives up his evenings and weekends in order to do this, signing himself up for things even if he may not find them enjoyable, understanding what needs to be done. Alfie is a nurturing person and mentors and supports new Cadets, showing kindness and compassion. He demonstrates mature levels of tact and diplomacy during difficult circumstances.

Pc Katie Le'Clere the unit leader added - 'During December last year we carried out an operation where we packed 200 gifts for elderly and vulnerable members of the Community. I was impressed by him when we attended a hospital ward as part of this initiative to deliver the gifts. This was a difficult environment and most of the Cadets required encouragement and guidance. Alfie went straight in to see the very poorly patients, sensitively and appropriately introducing himself. I was very impressed with his confident and mature approach.'

The Brighton and Hove Police Cadet Unit have been working on a project to deliver crime prevention advice targeting younger people in the Brighton and Hove area.

Targeting misconceptions and highlighting that anyone could be a victim of fraud, the Cadets have been working hard attending community events and hubs to spread the word and deliver crime prevention advice. We are incredibly proud of the hard work of the Cadets and their commitment to helping their local community and being an inspiration to their peers.

The High Sheriff of East Sussex, Mr Richard Bickersteth, said "I have been very pleased to see the dedication and commitment of the Brighton and Hove Volunteer Police Cadet Unit in bringing this initiative together." "They have worked on it intensively for a few months." "Their commitment to genuinely providing fraud awareness to all ages, but especially their own peer group who are more frequently victims of identity fraud was moving to see. I am very proud of the work they have done on it."



There has been further success this year for Sussex Police Cadets. The Hailsham Police Cadet Unit have won the "Commended Award" for their Crimebeat submission "Let's Stop VAWG". The judges were really impressed with The Hailsham Unit's submission and they have been encouraged to continue to work on their project and submit this again in 2025.

Mini Cadets in Kent provide Social Action

A 9-week Mini Cadet programme was delivered to 12 students within **St Margarets Clitheroe Primary school** in Tonbridge from the 2nd January 2024 to the 5th March 2024.

During this time the cadets were provided with a package that enabled them to learn more about policing, breaking down barriers, keeping safe online, first aid, drill, fitness, team building, communication, problem solving and more as well as identifying a social action project that was affecting their local community.

The Cadets identified the skate park at Long Mead park Tonbridge, as an area of concern due to the graffiti that was affecting the area and meant only a small number of people were attending.

It prevented young people from enjoying the space. So, led by PCSO Matthew, she engaged with the local agencies regarding the best approach and authorisation to paint over the graffiti and once approved the date was set.

The mini cadets caution sign set the scene and the cadets donned their safety equipment, grabbed their brushes and paint and worked tirelessly to make the place look amazing. Every inch of graffiti has gone, and PC Hill went back a week later to check the area and still no new Graffiti, which is phenomenal.





The work by the Mini Cadets and their leaders alongside the school taking ownership of this project, working in partnership with local agencies and seeing it through to the end has made the space so welcoming and safe again.

A huge well done to all of those involved and the mini cadets who took pride in all their work and being the excellent citizens, they are.

"This is what the cadet programme is all about. Changing lives, helping young people to learn and develop, do something positive in their community and building positive links with the police and staff. It was a proud moment to see their achievements during the award ceremony and to witness the smiles on each cadets face as they received their letter and certificate for completing the course.

Great Yarmouth Police Cadets are working towards THE EAST ANGLIAN AIR AMBULANCE CHALLENGE BADGE.


As part of the challenge Cadets are fundraising for The East Anglian Air Ambulance


Its been a busy couple of months for Dorset as back in February 9 Cadets from both their **Bournemouth** and **Christchurch** units joined forces with the charity
