All are extremely proud of the unit and are grateful not only to the cadets for spending time to collect, but friends and family who donated.



Towcester Cadet Unit in Northamptonshire collected nearly 900 items of clothing, toiletries and treats for children residing in local authority care placements. The 18 active cadets in the unit were given two weeks to collect items (with the Unit and Programme leaders only expecting them to fill 5 small rucksacks) and absolutely blew us out of the water with their collection (pictured below).

Huntingdon VPC helped at a charity just before Christmas wrapping presents which were going out with Christmas food hampers to families and children across the area. They also spent time in the warehouse sorting food items and preparing the hampers.

The Cadets raised £450 in a marathon five-hour stint of bag packing at the Huddersfield Morrison's and another £400 at the Dewsbury branch of Asda





On both days all the money was spent in store on food for local foodbanks. Recipients were the Welcome Centre in Huddersfield, and Bramwell's CIC Foodbank in Dewsbury. Cadets shopped for the items themselves and delivered the goods to the foodbanks, helping to unload and even stack the shelves.

PC Sally Baines, Cadet leader said: "Police Cadets learn about the different roles within the police and get involved in projects to help their local communities. On this occasion, they decided they wanted to raise funds for local foodbanks and do this by bag packing."

Trailblazer Cadets in Durham



Durham Cadets supported the Forces, Operation Trailblazer which targets hot-spot areas identified by the Home Office as having high levels of Anti-Social Behaviour.

The cadets were in Darlington dropping leaflets to residents to increase the awareness and how to report incidents.

The objectives of Operation Trailblazer are -

- An increased police and other uniformed presence to reduce anti-social behaviour, targeting hotspots.
- Additional patrols or other presence in a specific area at specific times when ASB is most prevalent.
- Building a lasting local community confidence in the response of the statutory organisations to ASB, using trusted advocates who can be a direct link between the communities and the statutory organisations.



Senior Cadets from South Durham also delivered an Action Fraud presentation to members of the public, highlighting dangers of scammers and fraud, this followed 3 weeks of work by the Cadets alongside the Economic Crime Team.













West Midland Cadets also help tackle ASB

Operation Advance is a force wide initiative which runs across the West Midlands Police area throughout the year. Where staff and officers from every policing department both locally and from a force level work together to deliver 24 hours of intensive policing operations.

Community engagement in Sussex

As the cost-of-living crisis continues to put pressure on low-income households, many are unaware of the programme and their children's eligibility to access free activity groups during the school holidays.

The Family Fun Day was an event at which local organisations were able to showcase their activity to families who are eligible for the HAF programme.



Crawley Police Cadets had a lovely day engaging with young people and their families at a Family Fun Day.

The day was organised by UK Harvest who were commissioned by West Sussex County Council to organise and host an event in Crawley, to promote the Holiday Activities and Food (HAF) programme to eligible recipient families across the borough.

The event was attended by approximately 1,000 people, including over 30 children. Crawley Police Cadets enjoyed the day engaged with Young People showing them how to take fingerprints, trying on different Police equipment and clothing, showing them around Police vehicles as well as being able to talk with parents around crime prevention advise and promoting positive activities for young people as well as helping to building strong positive relationships between the Police and the Community.

Nottinghamshire Cadets assist at Emergency Services carol service

Back in December, Police Cadets took part in the Nottinghamshire Joint Emergency Services Carol Service at Southwell Minster, with Nottinghamshire Police joined by Nottinghamshire Fire & Rescue Service and East Midlands Ambulance Service.

Throughout the evening, the Police Cadets assisted with collections during the service, and one of the Cadets helped with the readings and prayers.

The Carol service was also attended by the High Sheriff and her two High Sheriff Police Cadets.

They have developed a fantastic rapport with the owners of Animals Interactive.
They have a very small group of volunteers who run their shows in a variety of settings, including Care Homes, Schools, OAP complexes, Colleges, Prisons and run their Half Term Provisions too. A number of exotic animals are brought along for children and parents to touch, feel, cuddle and feed with Animals Interactive staff and volunteers running the sessions with groups of up to 30 children at any one time.

7 sessions that were arranged were held at 2 different venues, one being Pontymoile Community Centre in Pontypool, and the other Cwmbran Stadium. 2 Cadets supported the Team by handing out the animals, interacting with children and parents, along with conquering their own fears at the same time.

Leaders were extremely impressed with the attitude shown by the Cadets, especially when they discovered the task at hand on arrival at the venue. Each one of them could have backed down, and said no thank you, however they all pushed themselves out of their comfort zone to help run an amazing event, which will remain in their memories for a long time.

A pandemic forced him to spend the year at his home, Woolsthorpe Manor, and he used the time and space available to him to make world-changing discoveries. Newton's famous apple tree still stands at Woolsthorpe and the National Trust wants to invite the big thinkers of today to come and find their own inspiration in tackling's today's challenges.

Entries are open now to anyone aged 16-25 and close on 30 April 2024. Each award is worth up to the equivalent of £5,000 and includes a package of mentoring, expert support, time at Woolsthorpe Manor, resources, expenses and more to help the winners bring their big idea to life.
