The Safe to Operate standards have been adopted by the National Police Chiefs Council as the minimum standards VPC schemes should be meeting. Over the next few months, the National team will be working with police forces to assist them in doing so.

as the Strategic Director of the National VPC Hub at the end of March. His dedication and enthusiasm for the VPC has got us to where we are and, in addition, Nick Healey our Operations Director will be leaving us in June to re-join policing as an Operational Sgt. National VPC 'Safe to Operate' standards launched

Volunteer Police Cadet (VPC) schemes are unique to each police force and programs can depend on the priorities, demographics and geography of the force and its area.

However, what is a common thread throughout all schemes is the need to ensure that VPC schemes operate safely and over the last 18 months the National VPC team has been working with police forces to introduce a set of minimum standards that all schemes can align themselves to that are evidence based and specific to the youth sector and delivery of a regulated youth provision.

The Safe to Operate standards have been agreed by the National Police Chiefs Council, and the National VPC Safeguarding & Standards Hub will support forces in implementing the standards going forward.

Once implemented the standards will form the basis for schemes to remain safe to operate and provide Cadets and Leaders with support and guidance to ensure a safe and enjoyable experience for all.

The National VPC team would like to thank all those involved in bringing these standards to life, especially those subject matter experts from outside policing, whose advice and guidance has been invaluable in ensuring that the standards are acceptable, feasible and sustainable.

Leicestershire honour the Duke of Edinburgh & celebrate their Cadets

Leicestershire Police have planted a 'Duke of Edinburgh' rose to celebrate its police cadets who are working towards the Duke of Edinburgh (D of E) award and to honour His Royal Highness Prince Philip and his service to the country.

The double-flowered rose was planted in the force's memorial garden by Chief Constable Simon Cole and Police and Crime Commissioner Rupert Matthews on Monday 7 March with the force's D of E cadet leaders also in attendance.



Chief Constable Simon Cole said: "I'm thrilled that we've got over 100 of our cadets doing the Duke of Edinburgh award this year. It's a really important award which is about teamwork and working together to make communities better and stronger, and with a bit of outward-bound adventure as well. This rose is to acknowledge that hard work and of course to acknowledge the Duke's life of service to the country."



Police and Crime Commissioner Rupert Matthews added: "It was a great honour to plant the Duke of Edinburgh rose alongside the Chief Constable, both to commemorate His Royal Highness the Duke of Edinburgh, but also to recognise the achievements of the police cadets who are completing their D of E awards this year and in previous years, demonstrating their commitment to society, policing and their communities."

Leicestershire Police has been licensed to run the Duke of Edinburgh programme since 2016 and has supported a total of 178 police cadets to complete the award so far.

The cadets have been on expeditions all across the United Kingdom, including the Peak District, Lake District, Snowdonia and the Brecon Beacons.

DC Anthony Jones has been instrumental in the set up and the continual running of the D of E programme for the police cadets. He said:

"D of E is a huge part of Leicestershire Police's cadet programme and we're really proud to have more than 100 cadets doing their bronze, silver and gold awards this year."

"I just want to say a huge thank you to the whole D of E leader team. Without them we wouldn't be able to deliver such a successful programme, and also thank you to all the young people for volunteering their time to get involved in the award."

VPC Barclays Digital Eagles partnership soars

Barclays Digital Eagles have been working closely with the VPC to support the cadets across the UK with their training.

The topics covered are in line with the VPC Cadet journey and covers a wide range of skills that can benefit both cadets and the community they serve.

The program is delivered over a 4-week period:

- Week 1 Cyber security: fraud and scams An interactive presentation exploring the latest in cybercriminal activity and how to stay vigilant online.
- Week 2 Digital Wings (Barclays online learning platform) training sessions. Self-learning with modules in line with the VPC, covering topics such as social networking, motivating others, and much more.
- Week 3 Vulnerability case studies. Groups of cadets will discuss specific case studies based on people in vulnerable situations, exploring how they can be best supported.
- Week 4 These sessions shall be broken into two parts:
- 1. Learning how to become a confident presenter, whether virtual or face to face. A short presentation on how to plan, prepare, and build confidence in presenting.
- 2. Following on from our session during week 1 on the negative impacts to our digital footprint, we'll now discuss how our actions can instead create a positive online profile and presence.

As well as the above activities, Cadets will be introduced to Barclays branch managers within their area that they can work with to support your local community in fraud and scam awareness, as well as supporting vulnerable groups.

So far Barclays have supported 19 forces across the UK with their Digital Upskill program, with the aim of reaching more police forces in the near future.

History playing a part in the present





Congratulations! to all the Cadet Units in England who have taken part in the "Heritage Challenge" project over the last two years.

The project team would like to thank the leaders and cadets who not only rose to the challenge of addressing 'heritage crime' through social action community projects, but also the challenge of coping with the covid restrictions by innovating and adapting.

The initiative was funded and supported by Historic England, with additional support from the War Memorial Trust and Heritage Watch. 16 VPC units, from 20 Forces were involved with 443 cadets undertaking online training, using new resources via the Marshall Volunteer Portal.

All the units and cadets who went

on to complete social action projects received a certificate of achievement signed by the National Police Chief Council lead for Heritage Crime, Assistant Chief Constable Rachael Nolan of Essex Police, for their work, ranging from church-theft crime prevention



to updating condition reports of local war memorials.

Case Studies and a Good Practice guide



will feature in updated training materials on the Marshall Volunteer Platform in the coming weeks. These will be joined by a copy of the final evaluation report which is being compiled by the Institute of Public Safety, Crime and Justice.

Next Steps, Historic England will be exploring the feasibility of similar projects being developed with other youth organisations

through the Youth United Foundation (of uniformed groups which includes VPC). This will include input from a Youth Panel and the evaluation of VPCs experience.

The cadets were lucky to have senior instructor Ian Gauldie, from the Combat Academy who is a former W.U.M.A World Self Defence Champion come to teach them the Martial Art for a two-hour session. Also giving demonstrations and guidance to cadets during the evening were four of Ian's students who had been training in the art for up to nine years. The cadets learned how to block attacks and manoeuvre a person to the ground



using technique rather than force, showing that even the smallest person is capable of defending themselves.

The evening concluded with first aid CPR and AED instruction which is another vital tool learned by all Bracknell and Wokingham cadets.
