Staffordshire celebrate 10 years of Volunteer Police Cadets.

The Staffordshire VPC scheme was launched in 2013 and is celebrating its tenth anniversary, with 7,500 cadets having passed through the ranks in that time.

As with all VPC schemes, it has also allowed cadets to learn team-building skills, gain experience of working in different police sectors, attend weekly cadet meetings, participate in community and fundraising events, complete training drills and promote crime prevention initiatives.



In 2016 several Cadets had the privilege of forming a guard of honour for HM The King, then HRH Prince of Wales, when he visited Burslem Police Station. His Majesty shook the hand and spoke to each Cadet in the line.



Chris Noble, Chief Constable at Staffordshire Police, said: "The cadet programme has continued to grow year-by-year and the scheme is all about helping to develop great citizens for Staffordshire now and in the future. We've seen youngsters over the last ten years, from all backgrounds, who have grown in confidence immeasurably and play supportive roles at major events. This is what being in the cadets is all about – making a difference, helping the community, growing self-confidence and discipline.

It's been humbling to see so many cadets come through the ranks in the last ten years and wanting to make a difference in their communities."

Jake Pateman, Head Cadet at Staffordshire Police, said: "I've always had dreams of being a police officer and joined the cadet programme in July 2018. Immediately, I felt like I was part of a family.

I started out as a Cadet, then went onto become Deputy Section Leader, Section Leader and then Head Cadet. In my role as Cadet, I was also a mentor helping out new cadets and guiding them through their time at cadets from day one.

I'm very proud to be to have been part of such a fantastic organisation, where I've learnt key valuable skills such as: leadership, communication, time and teamwork skills."

Staffordshire Commissioner for Police, Fire & Rescue and Crime, Ben Adams said: "Ten years ago the Staffordshire Police Cadet scheme was created and funded by the Staffordshire Commissioner's Office to strengthen links between the police and young people and to help them learn leadership skills, gain confidence, and promote good citizenship.

After recently meeting the Stafford and Cannock units I can certainly see the impact the cadets are making on their communities as well as the impact the scheme is making on the cadets themselves.



The cadet scheme is a wonderful way of engaging with our local young people, especially those who are from challenging backgrounds. I am proud to see how the Staffordshire Cadet programme has encouraged other forces to adopt a similar approach with benefits being seen across the country. I look forward to seeing what is in store for them in the future."

Police Forces' recognise their Cadets' commitment



Back in January, Leicestershire Police held their first ever Cadets Award evening at Police Headquarters.

The event was an opportunity to say thank you for the numerous hours that the cadets have volunteered to the force over the last 12 months.



The evening began with an informal meet and greet, with Chief Constable Rob Nixon, Chief Superintendent Adam Slonecki, Superintendent Emma Maxwell and Deputy Police and Crime Commissioner Rani Mahal welcoming the cadets and their families.

Mr Slonecki opened the event which then saw CC Nixon present certificates to Cadets for their part in Op Adventurer. Op Adventurer consisted of three residential trips- "Light the Lakes" in June, an exciting trip to Krefeld in Germany in August and finally a residential trip to Redridge in Wales also in August.



It was then over to Sam Rouse, from the Duke of Edinburgh Awards (D of E) who handed out over 35 awards to Cadets for completing their bronze or silver D of E awards.

Following on from Sam, Mr Slonecki awarded some of the cadets with certificates for completing their CVQO (Cadet Vocational Qualifications Organisation) qualifications- presented by Steve Mills from CVQO and CC Nixon.

Mr Slonecki commended all the forces Cadet Leaders for their hard work and dedication throughout the cadet curriculum and paid special thanks to the unit leaders for their part in Op Adventurer, awarding them with Chief Superintendent awards.

Finally, the Volunteers in Policing (ViP) team were thanked for their continued hard work and ongoing commitment and were also awarded Chief Superintendent awards.

Ch Supt Slonecki said:

"The cadet programme is a great way for young people to gain qualifications, new experiences, make new friends and improve their confidence!"



"This award ceremony allowed us to say thank you to not only the cadets themselves, but also to our fantastic cadet leaders who give up their free time to give these young people such unique opportunities as well as the team who work so hard in the background to make sure everything is organised and runs as well as it does." In March Merseyside Police held a final ceremony for the Cadets who had competed their VPC programme over the last 18 months.

The Chief Constable, other senior officers, The High Sheriff, PCC, the National Association of Retired Police Officers (NARPO) and other dignitaries were all in attendance for a fabulous evening where the work and dedication the cadets had shown through their course was highlighted and awards presented.

All meeting at Force Headquarters. Many brilliant and exciting opportunities await them to experience and to help them develop over their journey with Merseyside Police.








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National CrimeBeat Awards Update







Achieving these awards would not be possible without the huge support from our Safer Neighbourhood Teams, PCSOs, operational support, rural crime, cybercrime and many of our +volunteers. It really is a huge holistic team effort, and everyone involved has earned this recognition. In our last newsletter we highlighted VPC schemes that had entered the National CrimeBeat awards 2023. With Derbyshire and Northumbria gaining commendations.

Whilst Lancashire Police, Nelson & Colne police cadet unit were invited to the Awards Ceremony at the Royal National Hotel in London, which took place in March, where they presented their project "- By Young People 4 Young People".





Two Northumbria cadets received a High Sheriff's Association Award for their efforts to combat and reduce anti-social behaviour.

Brandon and Daniel, aged 16 and 17, (pictured left) are two of the Force's trained cadets who assisted front-line officers with Operation Hayness, which aimed to combat youth disorder in North Tyneside.

they teamed up with officers and North Tyneside Council's trading standards team to carry out test purchases at a range of local off-licenses and shops.

The volunteers entered each shop and attempted to buy alcohol – to make sure stores across the region were making adequate checks and not selling alcohol to children.

During the operation, the volunteers were denied service by five premises in North Tyneside but were able to leave three stores with alcohol.

Thanks to the efforts of the Cadets, in collaboration with the officers and partner agencies, three shops were issued with fixed penalty notices and now risk losing their licence to sell alcohol due to their illegal actions.

A further positive result from this exercise was the ripple effect which it had on other businesses selling alcohol with local intelligence confirming that there was a reduction in the area of alcohol-based youth anti-social

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Dorset Cadets pay a visit to Force HQ.

During February half term 20 Dorset Senior Cadets from across all 4 of their units were welcomed to Force HQ and what a great day and experience they had.

(After a full risk assessment) the Cadets were kitted out and allowed into the firing range to watch officers train, there was also a talk from the armed response team and a chance to see an Armed Response Vehicle (ARV)





In the afternoon the Cadets took part in a Police training Hydra (interactive scenario) session using skills to correctly identify the location of suspected terrorists.

Then the Cadets were off to see some role play which the Ops Training team put together to demonstrate how officers diffuse and apprehend when making an arrest depending of the levels of aggression they may be faced with.

The Cadets also got to see and lift, some of the kit officers have to be trained to use and carry.

Cadets also assisted at a Dorset Police Road Safe event, promoting, and raising awareness of Road safety to the public at a local shopping centre.




Kent launch award scheme for younger Cadets


Kent Police have launched a pilot for the CVQO Lion Award for cadets aged 13 and 14 years old at their Dartford VPC Unit.

Up to 9 cadets will take part in several activities to help promote resilience, self-esteem, communication, problem solving skills and more.

The first session delivered was the Cat & Mouse game where one cadet was blind folded, whilst the other held a rattle ball. The "Mouse" cadet with the rattle ball had to take a step away from the "Cat" Cadet, then the Cat had to take a step towards the sound. This heightened the cadets' senses and took concentration to locate the Mouse. The remaining cadets stood in a circle to keep both cadets safe, but trying not to laugh at what they saw was very hard.



Staff Lindon-Taylor was the first to chuckle but also the first to cheer when the cat caught the mouse. Each cadet took turns and then at the end were asked a few reflective questions about what they had achieved, if they would change anything and what characteristics they felt they had utilised during the game.



The second game was the Gutterball Pass. Cadets were provided with 1m strips of guttering, a bucket was placed on the floor and a number of different balls were placed at the other end.

There was a tennis ball, golf ball, foam ball, pool ball and perforated ball. Cadets were given instructions to get one of the balls along the guttering and into the bucket. This may sound easy, and it was when they could link the guttering together, which they chose to do, but when this was changed i.e., they could no longer touch the guttering along the line and could not touch the ball, it became more of a challenge.

This clearly changed the dynamics of the group as some became more vocal with ideas to try, others felt more comfortable to follow the lead cadet. But throughout the game, each cadet was asked for their ideas so all their voices could be heard. The challenge was stepped up a gear by adding more balls to be rolled along the guttering. This was when the cadets were laughing and trying many different tactics. It was great to see everyone working together to achieve the end goal.

<u>The CVQO Lion Award</u> "promotes the development of 8-14 year olds through a varied and exciting programme of outdoor activities, first aid skills and social action projects. The programmes support young people's mental wellbeing, resilience and character, providing them with a safe environment to try something new and push themselves out of their comfort zone".

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Ex-Cadet honoured for role in Queens funeral



Alex Stuart, an ex-Volunteer Police Cadet from Lancashire has been honoured for his role in the Queen's funeral was also previously given a police award for rescuing a car crash victim whilst a Cadet.

The men, who are all members of the Royal Navy, have been awarded the silver Royal Victorian Medal in the as part of a special set of Demise awards.

The RVM is a reward for personal service to the sovereign or the royal family and is the personal gift of the King. The servicemen to receive the medal were all part of the group who accompanied the State Field Gun Carriage during the funeral service on September 19, last year.

And it's not the first time Alex's has been honoured for his courage under pressure. In 2019, a 16-year-old Alex made the front page after he was praised for helping an elderly lady who was knocked down by a car in a St Annes hit and run.

Alex (on the left of the picture) and his friend then both Lancashire Police cadets – put their training to use and Alex began diverting traffic while they waited for paramedics to arrive. The pair were hailed as 'heroes' and were awarded a certificate of praise from police chiefs. "

Their actions were admirable, and they should be an inspiration to other young people," said Insp Rob Conolly-Perch. "They are true heroes."

Speaking at the time of the funeral, his sister Lucy, 21, who studies at UCLan in Preston, said: "The day after the news of the Queen sadly passing away, Alex was inspected at his base and was selected there and then to be one of the 100 naval troops to pull the coffin from in front.

Alex was then selected to be one of the six steerers he was located right in front of the coffin during the parade yesterday and was televised to billions. We actually kept a tally of how many times Alex appeared on TV compared to the King and our Alex was on a lot more!

We are all so proud of him. "The list of those honoured also features RAF flight crew who transported the Queen's coffin from Scotland to London, coffin bearers, senior managers from the household and Government.

The RVO is bestowed by the King - and not on the advice of the prime minister - and was founded by Queen Victoria in 1896. Alex, 19, was one of the young troops handpicked for the honour of pulling Her Majesty's coffin in front of thousands of spectators and a huge worldwide television audience.



Alex, from Blackpool, helped steer the gun carriage carrying the Queen's coffin during the monarch's historic funeral procession.

He is one of even servicemen from Lancashire to have been honoured for their roles in the Queen's funeral.

Norfolk Cadets deal with Major incident

In February Herefordshire cadets travelled to Almondsbury, Bristol to visit the National Police Air Service (NPAS) for an educational but fun day out.


Some bleary-eyed cadets were collected early morning and travelled to Bristol via McDonalds!
