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THE QUEEN'S BIRTHDAY HONOURS



In June 2021, VPC Leader and PC, Chris Madden QPM, was awarded the Queen's Police Medal in the Queen's Birthday Honours. His award comes as recognition for his services to young people in the borough.

A member of West Yorkshire Police since 2005, and the VPC Leader for West Yorkshires Calderdale VPC unit, he has been committed to helping improve youngsters' lives and this has included coming up with a range of diversionary activity to steer them away from criminal activity. Using his

personal experiences and knowledge of fishing, he started by encouraging young people to become involved in a fishing programme. In 2014 he approached the owners of Sunnyvale and secured a lease for its use,

creating a classroom and transforming the site into an activity area.

The centre provides opportunities for climbing, archery and canoeing as well as education about subjects such as knife-crime and online safety. In February 2020, he created and directed a short film about the dangers of carrying a knife featuring young people he had helped and Police Cadets as the cast. The film was a huge success and was widely shown across the country on YouTube, which can be viewed here.

"I am honoured and privileged to accept this award," said **PC Madden**.
"I love my job and I am dedicated to improving the lives of young people from all backgrounds. I am also very grateful for the support and commitment from West Yorkshire Police, volunteers at Sunnyvale, the site owners, West Yorkshire Violence Reduction Unit, and various other organisations over the last five years who have helped and supported me with my vision for Sunnyvale and all we have achieved to date. I would also like to mention my amazing early intervention team who been by my side throughout."

"I am looking forward to how we can build and maintain the work in the area of early intervention in Calderdale and across West Yorkshire."

West Yorkshire Police's Chief Constable John Robins said: "I was privileged to be at the formal opening of Sunnyvale in 2016 and to see first-hand some of the excellent work that Chris helped create and maintain. I have no doubt that, thanks to Chris' efforts, a lot of young people in Calderdale and West Yorkshire have had the opportunity for a far brighter future than they otherwise might have had, and he should be very proud of all he has achieved. "On behalf of West Yorkshire Police and the communities of Calderdale, I thank and congratulate him for his dedication and commitment over many years to improving the lives of young people."

Present at this special event was HRH The Prince of Wales, The Prime Minister, The Home Secretary and Chief


Constable's from every force in the UK, alongside the families of fallen officers.

Lincolnshire Police is proud to recognise the enthusiasm, commitment, and contribution of all their cadets. The nominations for the Cadet of the Year award were of such a high caliber, which made the committee's decision more difficult. The force has on average about 140 cadets in seven Corps across the county.

The Cadet of the Year Award for 2019/20 was awarded to Jonty Horn from the Lincoln Cadet Corps for his commitment and



enthusiasm at cadets and in his wider community, specifically his work in the early stages of the pandemic. His interests at college linked with the pressing need to deliver PPE to the NHS staff and carers' in the community. He determined to use the facilities available to him to produce and supply visors and face masks on his home 3D printer. He produced and delivered the masks at a time when care homes and hospices were struggling to get hold of them.

Kacper Majewski, from Lincolnshire Police's Boston Cadet corps received a 'Highly Commended' certificate. That was presented to him by ACC Chris Davison at a local ceremony on 10th May.

The ceremony had been due to take place with other force achievement awards in October 2020 but was delayed due to COVID.

ACC Davison said, "It with pride and gratitude that I present Kacper with his Cadet of the Year Highly Commended certificate. Kacper exemplifies the values and behaviour that we expect of our cadets and this award is extremely well deserved. Kacper obviously has the respect and regard of his cadet leaders and fellow cadets."

Kacper has been a cadet since May 2018 and throughout his time with Boston cadets has given 100%. He is enthusiastic and always does everything to the best of his ability. During his time with the Police Cadets Kacper has been an excellent role model and his fellow cadets also voted him as Cadet of the Year for Boston corps.

Peter Hunn, Boston cadet leader says, "It is a pleasure to have Kacper as one of our cadets and he is a worthy recipient of the Highly Commended certificate. Over and above his contribution and participation at cadets, Kacper always gets involved in our community activities. He has been instrumental in helping us to reach out to young people from diverse backgrounds, especially those young people from Eastern European backgrounds. English is Kacper's second language, and he understands the difficulties of adapting to life in a different country. He is a real asset when we hold our recruitment open evenings or community events and is able to reassure and engage with young people from diverse backgrounds."

we are a team, for both each other and as a community. Being a Cadet has helped me to do and learn new things and people I wouldn't have gotten to experience anywhere else, but I have found that Cadets have helped me to improve as a person and to be more confident.

I have enjoyed taking part in Social Action. Going (sort of!) undercover for the Operation Sceptre to tackle knife crime nationally. We went into shops to attempt to buy knives to test purchase our local big national and independent shops was certainly the most fun, some of the reactions we got were great despite being so far or in some cases, so close to an actual sale!

My favourite guest speakers were when a couple of Inspectors from the Major Crime Unit came in. Getting to question them as well as being questioned when going along with a real-life murder they had had to deal with really gave me an insight into their job from a real-life perspective!

So, what does my future hold within the Cadets and Dorset Police? I'm asked this quite a bit but there's so much in policing that I'd like to do that I've ended up making a future timeline of what I'd like to do in the police and when. So far, I know that I want to be a community officer when I start, at some point become a Negotiator (as suicide prevention is one of the reasons why I want to be in the police), and then later be part of the rural policing team.

I look forward to becoming a junior Cadet Leader in a new Unit opening in Poole when I turn 18 years old. I hope to be a part of the Cadet family for as long as I can. I wish to inspire other kids into joining our police and being good people. Today, not everyone likes or respects the police and I think that reaching out and showing kids who we really are and what we are about together can change that perspective.'

- Lifestyles they cannot afford e.g., new mobile, clothes, money etc.
- Travelling at unusual times with new people
- Making or receiving excessive calls/texts
- Become secrePive or withdrawn from school, family, or friends



Mini-Police arrive in Kent

Kent Police launched the Mini Police Cadets programme resulting in an Award Ceremony on the 23rd June 2021. This was a monumental occasion to celebrate the achievements of the Mini Cadets during the 8 sessions they have taken part in, from the 22nd April 2021. Julia Lindon-Taylor, Mini & Junior Cadet Coordinator has seen first-hand how the Cadets have grown in confidence, overcoming personal barriers, and coming together as a team whilst developing good citizenship.



The Mini Cadets programme is available for 12 students aged between 8-11, however the Temple Hill Primary students were from year 6 and one from year 5 due to Covid restrictions.

The programme was designed to deliver a variety of topics in Policing including, ice breakers, online safety, road safety, how to contact the emergency services, writing in a Pocket Notebook, which all officers carry out in their job role and more.



Mini Cadets is part of the National VPC, and it is delivered by other forces, however, this is the first ever Mini Cadets programme within Kent.

The Mini-Cadets have taken part in Sports/Team building and Drill. Learned about the ranks in policing and other roles within Kent Police. The had the opportunity to meet local PCSO's and ask questions about policing and a day in the life of a Police Officer/PCSO which they thoroughly enjoyed.

They have completed the Mini Medics course, and all passed with flying colours so now know how to deliver CPR and place someone into the recovery position as well as treating minor injuries.

They created a notice board within the school to deliver online safety and road safety messages to other students, which then led onto their Social Action Event which was speaking with members of the public outside of their school about road safety and give drivers marks out of 10 also. This was very well received, and the school fed back that the event was a huge success and road users were respectful and calm on the day.

There has been an opportunity for the Mini Cadets to vote for their peers to become Mini Cadet Sergeant and as such Mini Cadet Childs was successful, receiving a certificate for this promotion. In addition to this Mini Cadet Jeevarasa has also been promoted to Cadet Sgt as he had demonstrated confidence in delivering the drill commands, helped his fellow cadets with tasks and is well respected also. Huge congratulations to both these cadets.

The latest session entailed a visit to Bluewater Police Station then onto the Kent Police Engagement Centre at Bluewater to learn more about Crime Prevention and keeping safe. The Cadets thoroughly enjoyed this day

and all were fully emersed into the experience, especially getting shut into a police cell for a moment or 2.

Julia cannot thank the staff at Temple Hill Primary School enough for all their support throughout the programme. Amanda Miles and Julie Rye have been instrumental in their support week in and week out, liaising with the cadets, working tirelessly behind the scenes.

Julia is now liaising with Primary Schools in the County, as well as the Youth Engagement Officer (YEO), PCSO's to invite them to take part in the Mini Cadet programme starting in October 2021.

The YEO's are invaluable to this programme and they are excited to be delivering this in the nominated primary school(s) within their area. This will enable 12 students per school to become the next members of the Kent Policing Family, gaining new experiences and learning new skills, which can leave a positive lifechanging imprint on their lives.



The changes observed from Session 1 to Session 8 has been phenomenal. The Cadets are all so proud to wear their uniform and be a part of this program and all have stated how much they have enjoyed each session".

Historic England award for Sussex Cadets



Cadets from Sussex have received certificates from Historic England for completing the VPC Historic England Crime challenge.





They are the first to complete the challenge with Cadets in seven other forces are also completing.



Cadets from Wealden Cadet Unit, East Sussex to investigated ways in which heritage crimes such as theft, vandalism, and anti-social behaviour, could be prevented, and they chose to focus on local church heritage sites. They did research, heard from visiting speakers, and conducted a number of crime prevention assessment visits to churches local to each Cadet, before pooling their findings

into a joint presentation to stakeholders. This was followed by visits to meet local church leaders.

Cadets taking part in the initiative, have been using bespoke VPC training materials to not only learn about heritage crime but to plan and lead their own social action.

As we approach Remembrance Day 2021 Cadets will again be invited to research and submit reports on the condition of their local War Memorials at General youth group resources | War Memorials Trust (learnaboutwarmemorials.org.uk)


The project is being independently evaluated by the Institute for Public Safety, Crime and Justice at Northampton University. The project is also being developed in Wales in partnership with Cadw. Currently at project initiation, a pilot is planned for Spring 2022 by Dyfed Powys Police.


that they were interested in but also the event management and security. They are still asking questions now about things they saw or experienced. Thank you!"
